Session -1: Inauguration

Ms. Bhabani Kumari Padhy formally welcomed to the participants including Sarpanch, PEOs, GPLF members, BRCs and BPM (OLM) of Angul District and resource persons. Mrs Amita Patro, Assistant Director SIRD & PR formally inaugurated the training and she said Health and Sanitation is the obligatory duty of the Panchayat. Stake holders from the concerned line department including Sarpanch and GPLF members invited for the training. Thus, all should come together and convergence the fund for ensuring primary health care and sanitation to all.

Session 2: Sanitation for all-ODF Plus Component in SBM (G)-II

Facilitator: Shri Subas Chandra Das discussed ODF plus components focusing to ODF Sustainability, Solid Liquid Waste Management and visual cleanliness. The major Points of Discussion are as below

Criteria of selection of ODF Plus Village:

- All household in the villages have access to functional toilet facility
- The village with more than 100householdss should have Community Sanitary Complex
- All institutions (School, AWC, GP office) in the village have access to functional toilet separate toilet for male and female
- All public places in the village are observed to have minimal litter, minimal stagnant wastewater and no plastic waste dump
- At least 80% households, Schools, Anganwadi and Panchayat offices have arrangement for managing biodegradable waste
- At least 80% households, Schools, Anganwadi and Panchayat offices have management of minimal liquid waste
- The village has plastic segregation and collection system
- The village should have prominently display at least 5 display IEC materials through wall painting / hoarding

Components of SLWM

- Solid waste management: Organic and Inorganic
- Liquid Waste Management : Grey Water and Black water (Faecal sludge Management/ Partially degraded faecal sludge)

Technologies for managing Biodegradable waste

- Underground simple manure pit or garbage pit
- Over ground brick lined manure pit or garbage pit (NADEP)
- Vermi composting
- Biogas

How to turn waste to wealth (Resource)

- Refuse
- Reduce
- Reuse
- Recycle
- Energy recovery
- Dispose

Plastic Waste Management:

It can be managed by 4Rs principle (Reduce, Reuse, Recycle and Recovery), segregation can be done primary at source level and secondary at village level. Processing and recycling can be done at Block Plastic Management Unit, ULB Material Recovery Facilities and at recyclers

Grey Water Management: Approx.

80% waste water generated in a village out of that approx. 90% is grey water. With improved water supply, the amount of waste water generated in a village is bound to increase. If not managed, it flows indiscriminately and becomes a serious health hazard. The waste water can be treated in decentralized manner through Soak pits, Leach pits, Magic pits, Kitchen garden etc. and the Centralized Treatment of the same can be done through Stabilization Ponds, DEWATS, Constructed Wetland and SBT Phytoid. The Grey Water can be utilized for Ground Water Recharge, Irrigation and Flush water etc.

Faecal Sludge Management (FSM):

- FSM is the collection, transport and treatment of faecal sludge from single pit, twin pit, septic tank latrines or other onsite sanitation systems.
- First this has to do assessment the types of pits in Rural areas.
- Where retrofitting is not possible, FSM shall be taken up.

Key Role of Panchayat for implementing SLWM activities

- Village level planning process, assessment of SLWM facilities, identification of issues and finalization of solutions for SLWM & develop system for O & M
- Provisions in the GPDP for SLWM management activities & converge various financial resources like SBM, MGNREGA, PESA, GOBARDHAN, NRHM, School Education, District Mineral funds.
- Coordinate for estimates and fund mobilization and technical support from concerned offices for implementation.
- Campaigns and competition to maintain cleanliness & awareness generation during Swachhta Diwas & Gram Sabha

Key IEC/ SBCC messages for ODF Plus:

For bringing the behaviour change, to deliver the following messages is an impactful way through the use of culturally sensitive and gender sensitive humour message.

- Waste segregation at source level
- Plastic waste management focusing 4Rs & green events
- Bio-degradable waste management focusing various technologies
- Faecal sludge management
- Retrofitting of toilet technology
- Menstrual Hygiene management- focusing to safe disposal
- Hygiene promotion including hand washing at critical level and personal hygiene etc.

Session 3: Gaon Kalyan Samiti & Village Health Plan

Facilitator Mrs. Geetanjali Swain, State Co-ordinator CFP took the session on Gaon Kalyan Samiti and Village Action Plan focusing to role of GKS in addressing public issue, village Health Plan and inter sectoral convergence to health issues. The key highlight of the discussion as mentioned below;

- Health is wealth, health is key to human survival, happiness and wellbeing. Convergence action of health, education, nutrition, livelihood and WASH is required for health and wellbeing of the community
- People should understand and give importance to the health. They should trust to the service and delivery of the Govt.
- ASHA is the community volunteer; facilitate action to address issues related to health and its social determination. Sensitize community on health and hygiene & also act as linkage between community and health facilities
- Community and PRIs should provide support to ASHA for effective implementation of her duties during home visit and other responsibilities
- Each GKS prepare a need based comprehensive village health plan on the basis of GKS untied fund expenditure. VHP is prepared in a consultative manner involving the community which includes issues related to health, nutrition, water sanitation and other issues with details responsibility, time line and budget required. Updated on a quarterly basis and publicity in Swasthya Kantha and other places
- Important aspects of VHP are participation of community members involving all hamlets and categories of people, follow up participatory methods for ownership of community. It should be responsibility sharing, timebound and result oriented.
- Proactive role of Sarpanch and ward members is required for fund convergence towards planning and execution of VHP.
- GKS should integrate with GP for discussion in GP meeting and consolidated GP health plan also need to be prepared.
- GP needs support effective implementation and maximum utilization of health and sanitation services & mobilize people for availing of health and sanitation services.
- Addressing issues related to health and sanitation needs integration and convergence. All the committees, organizations at the grassroots level needs to act together for integration of health, nutrition, water sanitation.
- PRI should Monitor the implementation of the programs, ensure that the people get their dues, entitlements and services in time. Inform the authorities regarding the gaps in the implementation of health and nutrition programs

Session 4: Role of GP in planning and monitoring the Health Services

Facilitator: Mrs Amita Patra, Assistant Director facilitate the session of Role of GP in planning and monitoring the health services with focusing to localizing SDG, integration of poverty reduction plans with Disaster Risk Reduction Plan, standing Committee and convergence in GPDP. The key highlight of the discussion as mentioned below;

- Panchayat is responsible for support economic development and provide social justice to the peoples by effective implementation & convergence of flagship programmes related to 29 subjects in XI Schedule of constitution.
- Health is lineage with drinking water, sanitation, communicable and non communicable diseases, reproductive mental child and adolescent health.
- Water, Sanitation and health are obligatory and discretionary function of Gram Panchayat as per Odisha GP Act of the section 44 & 45.

- Seven Standing Committees at each tier of PRI. The fourth Standing Committee deals with Health, Social Welfare and Women and Child Welfare. The Committee prepares the plan and finalises the projects with resources and presents before GP
- Village Poverty Reduction Plan prepared by SHG network which serves as sub plan for preparation of GPDP.
- Goal3: Ensure healthy lives and promote wellbeing for all at all ages and goal 6 states water and sanitation to all.
- Department of health deals reduction of IMR, reduction of MMR, 100% Immunisation, skilled birth attendant, institutional delivery, increased access to health care facilities, decline child sex ratio, nutrition and Health education and health Insurance
- Women of women and child development deals reproductive health, growth monitoring of Infant, supplementary Nutrition, immunisation, health education and Referral services, over all development of Pre-school children, health &Hygiene of adolescence girl, prevention of early child marriage and revitalisation of WSHG
- Department of Panchayati Raj and Drinking Water deals water supply, functional household tap connection, ODF Plus, Solid & Liquid Waste Management, plastic Waste Management and Visible cleanliness of village.

Session 5: Water for all- Jal Jeevan Mission / BASUDHA Scheme

Mr. Gautam Pattanaik, State Water consultant Water taken the session on water for all focusing to Jal Jeevan Mission and BASUDHA scheme covering the sub topic rural Water Supply Overview, Water Safety / Water Quality in Gram Panchayat, O & M and Water Tariff and Water Budgeting in GPDP (Priorities, Sources of Financing).

Water is life, water require for personal cleanliness, toilet use, cooking, hand washing from morning to night. There are various sources of water such as tube well, open well, PWS and gravity based PWS. However, lack of ownership at community level water could not managed which some places water following over the tap and some place people fighting for water. Water sources should be cleaned and monitored by the community in regular interval. Safe water is water that cannot harm the user, even when it is consumed over long periods. Safe water should be free from: Pathogenic agents, Harmful chemical substances and should be Pleasant to taste, and usable for domestic purposes. In order to manage the water supply system, it is required for protect water sources and ensure water quality, ensure water security, community participation and local village institute should take ownership for operation and maintenance of water supply system. Govt. of India is being

implemented Jal Jeevan Mission JJM and providing functional household tap connection to all households with 55LPCD. Govt. of Odisha providing 70 LPCD under BASUDHA schemes he told. Handling of safe drinking water from source to mouth including collection, distribution, storage is important and need to be handled at all level sincerely. The following activities need to be focused for handling of water such as;

- Water quality test at least two times both chemical and bacteriological test (before and after monsoon)
- Water quality monitoring and surveillance by users/ community
- Use of Field test kit for monitoring the water quality
- Water response plan based on surveillance
- Operation and maintenance of water sources

ICDS functionaries should focus water security including source sustainability, daily operation and maintenance including user fees, water quality monitoring and surveillance and formation of VWSC for address the community issues.

Session 6: WASH linkage Health & Nutrition

WASH Officer Mr. Narendra Singh Chauhan briefed WASH linkage with health and nutrition focused on components of WASH, analysis of F-diagram and key WASH behaviours. He started the session with an animation video demonstration on important of WASH for human health. Through pictures, flowcharts and info graphics, he went on to explain how an unhygienic environment, coupled with Inadequate care-feeding practices and household food insecurity cause disease and inadequate dietary intake, disease, malnutrition. Therefore, under consumption along with poor WASH led to under nutrition.

He explained the F-diagram and told that most of the diseases which results in diarrhoea are spread by pathogens (disease causing organisms) found in human excreta (Faeces). The faecal oral mechanism, in which some of faeces of infected individual are transmitted to the mouth of new host through one of a variety of routes such as Finger, Fly, Fluid, Field and Foods and gets sick. The most effective ways of reducing diseases transmission is to erect "primary" barrier which prevent pathogens to entering the environment. This can be done by

- Construction and use of toilet which can prevent the spread of diseases by flies, and the contamination of drinking water, field/ floors
- Washing hand with soap after defecation and before eating

Session -7: Importance of Health & Nutrition and role Gram Panchayat

Facilitator: Dr. Jayanti Dey, Instructor MLTC, SIRD & PR

Major Points of Discussion: Importance of Health & Nutrition and role Gram Panchayat focusing to health and nutrition services available at Community Level, importance of VHSND (Village Health Sanitation and Nutrition Day) and role of Panchayat in providing health and nutrition services. Village Health, Sanitation and Nutrition Day (VHND) was conceptualized under the National Health Mission (NHM). It is being implemented across the country since 2007 as a community platform, connecting the community and health systems and facilitating convergent actions. It attempts to bring health, early childhood

development, nutrition and sanitation services to the doorstep and promote community engagement for improved health and wellbeing. It serves as a platform for provision of preventive services to all sections of the population especially to marginalized and vulnerable communities.

Objectives:

- Improve availability of health, nutrition, early childhood development and sanitation services at community level
- Provide information and generate awareness about entitlements and government schemes related to health, early childhood development, nutrition and sanitation
- Act as a platform for counselling to bring improvement in health, nutrition and sanitation practices at individual, family and community level
- Identify cases requiring referrals or families requiring support and link them with appropriate service providers in the relevant sector.

Components:

Health, Nutrition, Sanitation and ECD (Early Childhood Development)

In Odisha immunisation is not done in VHSND

Departments involved:

- Health and Family Welfare (DHFV),
- Women and Child Development (DWCD),
- Social Welfare (DSW),
- Panchayati Raj Department,
- Rural Development (RDD),
- Drinking Water and Sanitation Missions and
- community level stakeholders including VHSNC members, self-help groups (SHGs), Community Based Organizations (CBOs)

VHSND Planning

- Mechanism to promote community action for better health, nutrition and sanitation
- For successful implementation of VHSND requires thorough planning and preparatory actions assuring appropriate infrastructure, logistics, preparing the site and community for the event
- ANM is responsible for preparation of VHSND plan and share with block medical officer.
- Block MO will share the plan with line depts like ICDS, Rural Development and panchyatiraj.
- These will be used to prepare supervision and monitoring plans for the month
- Representatives of Panchayat and the VHSNC will help Anganwadi workers and ASHAs to publicize VHSND and display them at appropriate public places
- Also help AWWs and ASHAs in community mobilization especially for the hard to reach and resistant families as well as in logistics arrangements for

Village Health, Sanitation and Nutrition Day

Beneficiaries

Pregnant women, lactating women, children 0-6 years old, undernourished children including SAM children (0-59 months) and adolescent girls (10-19 years).

Role of Village Health, Sanitation and Nutrition Committees (VHSNCs):

The purpose of the VHSNCs is to improve awareness and access of community for health services. Their role for VHSND includes the following – to facilitate mobilization of pregnant women and children particularly from marginalized families, facilitate the organization of VHSND and support the ANM, AWW and ASHA in conducting the VHSND, help to ensure availability of amenities in the VHSND site, coordinate and facilitate referrals especially for transport arrangements as required.

Session 8: Effective utilization of tied fund of 15th CFC & SFC Grants for water and sanitation projects

Mr. Sankuli Biswal, State CB Consultant, had taken the session on effective utilization of Finance Commission Grants tied fund on water and sanitation focusing VAP and VHP and integration in GPDP. He highlighted in line with 73rd Amendment to the Constitution of India, 15th Finance Commission has recommended grants to Rural Local Bodies/ Panchayat Raj institutions (RLBs/ PRIs) for next five years i.e. up to 2025-26. It has also identified drinking water supply and sanitation as national priority areas for RLBs and therefore 60% of the fund is provided as tied grant.

He discussed on importance of Water and Sanitation focusing to the guideline of Jal Jeevan Mission, BASUDHA and SBMG Phase-II. Govt. at aimed to provide potable drinking water, improved sanitation and hygiene hold the key to public health. To improve the lives of people living in rural areas and reduce the drudgery of women and girls in fetching water, often from afar, the Government of India in partnership with the States is implementing Jal Jeevan Mission to provide functional tap water connection to every rural household of the country by 2024. Similarly Govt. of Odisha has targeted 70LPCD functional tap water connection to all households of rural Odisha under BASUDHA scheme. In order to ensuring service delivery to the piped water supply 50% of tied funds of CFC will be spent for supply of drinking water, rain water harvesting and water recycling. 15th CFC/5th SFC fund can be utilized for augmentation of water sources, Providing piped water supply for drinking, hand washing and use in toilets in public institutions like schools, anganwadi centres, retrofitting of existing water supply schemes/ systems to improve service delivery, taking up emergency breakdown and up-gradation post disasters, payment of re-occurring electricity charges of intra-village water supply systems in case of shortfall in-spite of collection of user charges, human resource on outsourcing basis and O&M expenses of the activities, water audit and petty expenditure etc.

Session 9: Development and presentation Case Study in GP on Health and Sanitation

Next session was development of case studies in the technical support of Mrs. Bhabani Kumari Padhy, WASH Consultant. Three groups had formed by involving each category of

stakeholders and assigned the following three topics for group discussion

Group-I Health for all

Group-II Water for all

Group-III Sanitation for all

The group has discussed and developed the case study taking one of the GP of the Sarpanch refereeing to the following format.

Profile of GP	Problems before intervention	Progress as on date	Challenges for implementation	Strategy for making success both planning and execution	Output	Out come
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After group discussion, the concerned group presented the case study before the house.

At the ending of the program a quiz session was held based on the two days training contents through open house discussion. The participants cleared their doubt after question-and-answer session.
